## ***From the Rector:***

### **What Is a Community Candle?**

*I have a large, glass bowl filled with sand in the Rectory. When I began leading a small group for spiritual formation my last year at Good Shepherd, I placed four candles of varying sizes in it. The candles burned every time the group met. As we talked, laughed, prayed, and cried together, the wax dripped into intricate patterns in the sand, hour by hour. The candles went through different shapes, and the wax layer on top of the sand grew to a great thickness. We all thought of these as "our candles," and we knew that the layers upon layers of wax told a story of their own, just as we told our stories to each other. Our group time and our prayer was somehow sealed into all those layers. The candles were so large that I still have some room left to burn, and I think of the group every time as I see the layers and stories in the wax.*

*At Immanuel, I invite you into a new tradition with me. I will bless a candle at the beginning of each new liturgical season, beginning after Easter. The candle will be the color of the liturgical season, and it will be in the parish hall for all to use. Every time you have a gathering of any kind, light the candle and say the prayer on the card next to it with your group or team. Let the candle burn while you are together, and then extinguish it and put it back where you found it. Because it is blessed in our worship, it will remind us that no matter what tasks or ministries*

*we are doing, we represent the entire community. Because it will*

*burn and collect stories of its own, as individuals we will be reminded of everyone working and praying around us here.*

*There is a purple candle in the parish hall for Lent. I look forward to blessing the white Easter candle with you the Sunday after Easter, and we will use it as we move toward Pentecost.*

***Message from the Senior Warden***

*On Sunday, March 14, the Vestry and Officers met with Bishop Rabb as part of his official visit to Immanuel. Bishop Rabb opened the meeting by expressing his joy with Immanuel’s call to The Rev. Megan Stewart-Sicking to be our rector and his excitement about Immanuel’s future with new leadership. He also filled us in on personnel changes at the Diocesan Office and gave us the names of his colleagues to whom we can direct our requests for information or assistance. When the conversation turned to finances, Bishop Rabb reminded us that most congregations who are fortunate enough to have endowments (or significant investment funds, in the case of Immanuel), rely on bequests from parishioners to replenish and grow these assets. He acknowledged that Episcopalians seem to have a “fear of talking about money”. He encouraged us to seek ways to become more comfortable and*

*more deliberate about discussing our personal financial commitment to our church (e.g., through an annual pledge; through a bequest) with our family members. ## **Second Update on Immanuel's Financial Outreach for 2009**

*Our parish outreach giving for 2009 was detailed in February's newsletter, with an update in March that raised the total to \$9,472.03. Since then, there are three more 2009 contributions to add, which came from Immanuel's operating budget: \$331 to Food for the Poor; \$331 to the Maryland Fuel Fund; and \$331 to Doctors Without Borders. This raises the total to \$10,472.03. If we divide this by our total expenses for 2009 (\$171,212), our outreach represents 6.1%.*

Last year, we were pleased that word of our Baroque Organ Festival got around, and we had guests from Washington, D.C., York, Pa., Southern Maryland, Wilmington, Del, and the Eastern Shore, as well as from the Baltimore area. This is an excellent form of Outreach for Immanuel Church.

In planning this event, I spoke with several organists whose churches have similar events, and we all agreed not to plan conflicting dates. Thus the Bach Marathon at St. David's Episcopal Church, Roland Park, (in its 34th year and runs from 12:30 pm to 6:30 pm) is the second Sunday in February. The French Organ Marathon at Grace United Methodist Church, (in its 12<sup>th</sup> year and runs from 2:00pm to 6:00pm) is the second Sunday in May, and the Baroque Organ Festival at Immanuel Episcopal Church, Glencoe, is on the last Sunday in April. These dates are locked in place from year to year, so that fans of organ music can attend all of these events.

## Music Notes

Music is a universal non-verbal language that often reaches our innermost heart when words fail. It also allows us to tap into the social, cultural, and aesthetic traditions of different cultures and historical eras.

In planning music for Holy Week and Easter, one tries to find choral and organ literature that paint

a musical picture for a particular service. For instance, Palm Sunday starts out on a triumphant note, but ends quietly and more somber, leading us into Holy Week. Good Friday's music, you will note below, paints a picture of sorrow and heart felt pain, but come Easter, it starts off with a bang and ends the same way.

Please be reminded that the service on Maundy Thursday is a spoken service, with no music.

Easter Day we will have our usual 8:00am service with organ music and congregational hymns, and 10:15 will be a Festival Choral Eucharist.
