***From the Rector:***

***Stewardship Time...***

A wise mentor once told me, “Every problem in prayer is a problem in life, and every problem in life is a problem in prayer.” That sentiment holds true for me on many levels, but particularly when it comes to stressors or uncertainties we sometimes face. If I have trouble focusing in prayer, or if something keeps bothering me again and again, perhaps that means there is something to which I need to pay more attention in my daily life. If I have a problem that appears again and again in daily life, perhaps I will see that reflected in prayer, or I need to take it there!

As you have heard me say in my stewardship letter this year, we have faced many uncertain times in our past—as individuals and families, as a congregation, and as a nation. However, we are now facing a series of years when our financial health has been quite uncertain, and no one knows what the immediate future will hold. But we still need to pay our bills. We still have mortgages, electric bills, grocery bills, and all the other regular budgetary issues. Many of us are struggling, dipping into savings, or even borrowing from our retirement plans without knowing how we might pay it back. The same circumstances we face in our own lives we also

face as a Christian community together. Over a period of years, our expenses have risen, and our giving has declined. Like many individuals, the Church corporately is dipping into savings, borrowing from the endowment, and doing what we need to do to pay our expenses.

Our reality is our reality, and it is simply a statement of fact: We need more money to pay our bills and to continue to enjoy the ministries and programs we count on as a community. But at the same time, when I look around on Sundays and at programs and meetings, I do not see a group full of anxiety. I see people of hope with great love for God and for Immanuel Church. And I see excitement and dedication wrapped in happy faces, singing voices, helping hands, and praying hearts.

Please review my recent stewardship letter to you and consider how you might support our budget for 2011. In the meantime, we cannot guess. We cannot cut. We cannot grow. We simply cannot make a budget without you. I ask that you return your cards by October 24 when all the pledges will be blessed and our campaign will move to its next phase of budget planning. And please be in touch with questions, joys, or concerns anytime. Thank You!!!

## Two “arches”

The first is “*arch-ives*,” the collection of Immanueliana kept since the 1870s: photos, building plans, vestry minutes, letters, treasurers’ reports, Women of Immanuel and church school records, bulletins and newsletters, reports to the Diocese, and, of course, “miscellanea.” These have been stowed in odd corners of the church buildings, and in parishioners’ homes. At last we have a safe, humidity- and temperature-controlled space--2 closets near the church office. I have gone through them just enough to assemble them into basic subjects, to toss out some papers that I knew were not worth keeping (we don’t need the bank statements from the 1930s), and to find some great materials that tell the story of how--and why--this parish came to be and managed to serve our community all these years. I am also seeing that there are gaps that need to be filled. Some can be learned from the F. Garner Ranney Archives of the Diocese of Maryland (one of the best collections in the Episcopal Church), and some may be lurking in the closets and drawers of parishioners and others. If you have any, bring them for us to copy or keep. Now we have two next steps: [1] to enlist (or draft) folks who will take the time to organize them. For this there are Guidelines for Parish Archivists; I guarantee you that for every 59 minutes of routine sorting there will be at least one “Eureka” moment which you’ll love to share with others.

[2] The second is to create an accurate roster of parish members. One key item which seems to have been lost forever is the Parish Register of communicants, baptisms, confirmation, weddings, and burials from 1976 through 1996, and no new one has been made, so constructing such a roster will take a lot of detail work. I have promised the rector that I would try to get this done before our next Annual Report in February. This will mean contacting many of you about details of your status, especially whether our members who are on our active list have been confirmed or transferred in.

The other “arch” is *arch-itecture*, Immanuel’s “built environment.” As Winston Churchill said, “First we shape our buildings, and then our

buildings shape us.” On Saturday, Sept. 11, a group organized by the Church Club of the Diocese toured Immanuel and four other North County churches, led by James Wollen, A.I.A., an enthusiastic and knowledgeable church historian. The church was built in 1871, a particularly fine example of the Gothic Revival which still helps to define the special place of the Episcopal Church in America. Jim Wollon admits that even he cannot find who the architect was, though we know that Dr. Philip Austen had a hand in some details; he was the brother of Anne McCulloch, founder of Oldfields .

Also, no-one knows what the turret over the west end is--it’s not a chimney or a bell tower. What do you think?

The parish house, in the same style, was opened in 1881, and the rectory, a fine example of a country home, was built in 1881. All three buildings have been enlarged and enhanced many times but retain their integrity; they belong where they are and they define what we are.

Devotion to the past can become merely “*arch-aim*,” the dead hand of the past. Our faith is “good news,” not “good olds.” But to know where we are going, we need to know where we have come from. What a blessing to have a church which is an *arch-type* of our pilgrimage in Christ!


